THE RABBI'S MESSAGE

We are now nearing the end of the "Three Weeks" the period of mourning for the destruction of the *Bais Hamikdash*, the Temple. This period began July 6 with the Fast of the 17th of Tamuz and will end this coming Monday night and Tuesday, July 26-27, with the fast of the Ninth of Av. The Chafetz Chayim points out that it is most critical for us to be aware of the sins that caused the *churban*, the destruction of the *Bais Hamikdash* and prolong the exile. By correcting these faults we can avert future tragedy and thereby bring about the future redemption.

In the Tractate Yoma (9b) the Gemarrah (Talmud) asks: "Why was the first temple destroyed?" The Gemarrah attributes the destruction of the First Temple to the Jewish nation's transgressing the three cardinal sins: idolatry, adultery, and murder. However, the Gemarrah asks: "During the era of the Second Temple when Judaism was flourishing the Torah was studied and people were performing many mitzvoth, why was the Second Temple destroyed?" The Talmud attributes the destruction of the second temple to sin'at chinam, unjustified hatred, and its derivatives including lashon harah, speaking derogatorily. It equates baseless hatred of our fellow man with the three major sins of idolatry, adultery, and murder. In fact, it was the lashon harah of the meraglim, the spies, which caused the death

THE President's Message

Greetings to all. I hope that this finds you in good health and enjoying your summer.

The Torah (Parshat Vayishlach, Numbers 13) recounts the episode of the spies sent by Moshe to reconnoiter the land of Canaan (Eretz Yisroel). Rather than bringing back a positive report of the land that Hashem was giving them as a gift, they returned with a disparaging report, causing the people to fear and weep. G-d then vowed that henceforth the day of Tisha B'av would always be a day of weeping. As a result of the spies' report, the Israelites were forced to wander in the wilderness for 40 years until the generation that left Egypt died. Only then could they enter the promised land. Thenceforth, and throughout their history, Tisha B'av has been an infamous and ominous day for the Jewish people, the day when both temples were destroyed.

Thus we can see the awesome power of speech the *lashon harah* of 10 spies against the land of Israel resulted in such tragedy and its consequences continue to this day. By the same token, speech can have a powerful positive effect, as well. With the proper words, we can support our brethren and through the sanctification of G-d's name, we can create a world of good that will have far reaching consequences.

Let us remember to always use our power of speech for good and never utter a disparaging word. I hope you all have an easy fast and a great summer.

Laws & Reflections Relating to Tisha B'av

In addition to the restriction against eating or drinking, we refrain from bathing, anointing, wearing leather shoes and marital relations.

The *Talmud* lists five tragedies which befell our people on *Tisha* B'Av.

- On this day, the *meraglim* (spies) returned and it was decreed that the generation that had left Egypt would die out in the desert during the forty years of wandering.
- The first *Bais Hamikdash* (temple) was destroyed by the Babylonians.
- The second *Bais Hamikdash* was destroyed by the Romans.
- The fortress of Betar was destroyed by the Romans and Bar Kochba's revolt was crushed.
- The city of Jerusalem was razed to the ground and plowed over.

In addition, other tragedies which have occurred on *Tisha B'Av* include the beginning of the First Crusade in 1095; the expulsion of Jews from Spain by King Ferdinand in 1492; and the beginning of World War One in 1914.

Other highlights in the Month of Av:

Shabbat Nachamu – July 31: The Shabbat after Tisha B'Av is called Shabbat Nachamu, named for the Haftorah read that Shabbat. It is taken from Isaiah, Chapter 40, and begins with the words "Nachamu, Nachamu Ami" (Comfort, comfort my people). Shabbat Nachamu is the first of seven Haftarot of consolation.

Tu B'Av (15th of Av) – August 2: This was the day when the Jews in the dessert realized that the generation of the *midbar* had stopped dying – no more would die because of the sin of the *meraglim*.

When the Jewish people lived on their land, this day was an occasion for celebration of various events; the *Talumud* calls Tu B'Av one of the most joyous days of the Hebrew calendar..

Tachanun is not said on this day.

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of the generation of the *midbar* (the desert) and prevented their entrance into *Eretz Yisrael*. Ultimately *Tisha B'av*, the night of the *meraglim*'s return, was to become the saddest day of the Jewish calendar.

Thus, we see how important it is to eliminate *sin'at chinam* and to promote *ahavas chesed*, loving kindness, and all its ramifications, thereby bringing about the *geula sh'laimah*, the true redemption.

During the era of the great Rabbi Akiva, twenty-four thousand of his students also met a tragic fate due to their lack of *kavod habriyos*, honoring their fellow man. It was Rabbi Akiva who stated that "*Ve'ahavtah lerayacha kamocha* (*Vayikra* 19:18) - *zeh klal gadol batorah*" - "To love your fellow Jew as yourself is the most fundamental principle of the Torah."

Let us pray that in the merit of increasing our love for our fellow Jews we will help bring about the rebuilding of the *Bais Hamikdash* and the coming of the *Mashiach* speedily in our days.
