#### THE RABBI'S MESSAGE

The month of Nissan, which marks the redemption of the Jewish Nation from Egypt, is described in the special supplemental prayers of Shabbat Hachodesh as "the season of G-d's Love for Israel". According to Ben Zoma (Mishna Berachot I:5) as quoted in the Haggadah, we are required to recall the Exodus from Egypt, not only once, but twice daily – morning and night, for it is a testimony to the fundamental principle of "G-d's Divine providence". Just as Hashem personally redeemed Israel from Egypt, so to does He continuously guide the universe and man's fate.

On Passover, not only do we remember the Exodus, but we relive it. We conduct a Seder which commemorates the very first seder of our ancestors which they made on the eve of the Exodus. We simulate the Exodus by eating Matzah representing the soul bread which they ate when they left Egypt, and we recall the bitterness they suffered during their enslavement by eating bitter herbs.

The highlight of the Seder, second only to the matzah, is the drinking of the four cups of wine which we are told, represents the four freedoms expressed in the Torah (Exodus Chapter VI:6 & 7) "And I will take you out... and I will rescue you... and I will redeem you... and I will make you my nation." These four expressions of freedom are not merely synonyms of the word freedom, but represent four distinct acts which commemorate G-d's compassion and love for His people Israel. The redemption from Egypt was not only a physical expereince, but a spiritual one as well and each of these two freedoms had two phases to them. Let us examine the full text as transcribed in the Torah to fully appreciate its greatness. 1) "And I will take you out from under the burdens of the Egyptians. This refers to the first phase of their physical freedom." Five or six months prior to the Jews' departure from Egypt the Egyptians stopped the enslavement. However, the Jewish people

Don't forget to authorize Rabbi Mykoff to sell your chametz for Passover! A Power of Attorney form can be found on page 8 and must be returned to the synagogue (or called in, in case of emergency) <u>no later than 10:00 a.m.</u> Wedndsday, April 8th.

Our Community Seder will be held the second night of Passover, Thursday, April 9<sup>th</sup>; services will be held at 7:00 p.m. followed by the Seder. Please make your reservations early via our website or by calling the synagogue. As usual, it is free to the community. If you are interested in participating in a seder on the first night, please call the office.

Please let us know of any suggestions you may have to make our site more serviceable to the community.

### **PASSOVER LAWS & CUSTOMS**

On Passover we celebrate the physical freedom of the Jewish people from their Egyptian bondage and at the same time their spiritual liberation from the ancient Egyptian idolatrous way of life. Thus we commemorate our physical freedom together with our spiritual liberation.

#### **Maot Chitim**

*Maot Chitim* (wheat money) refers to the custom of collecting money during the first days of Nissan, from each individual in the community according to his ability to give. This money is used to assist the poor to purchase food and other necessities for Passover.

*Maot Chitim* is a separate requirement from the year round mitzvah of giving *tzedakah* (charity). *Maot Chitim* is required since one cannot fully appreciate the implication of Pesach as *Zman Cheirutenu* - the time of our freedom, if he knows that his neighbor is hungry and in need. If he knew that there were hungry people in his town and he had not bothered to come to their assistance, he would not be fulfilling his commitment, which we proclaim at the *Seder* – "Let all who are hungry come and eat."

#### Chametz

Unique to Passover is the eating of Matzah and the stringent prohibition against eating *Chametz*, or even possessing any *Chametz*. Thus, we have to prepare the home by ridding it of all *Chametz* before Passover.

*Chametz* is a general term for all foods and drinks made from the five grains: wheat, barley, rye, oats and spelt, or their derivatives, which have fermented. Additionally, the prohibition includes the taste of *Chametz* absorbed in food,

## utensils or dishes. The slightest trace of *Chametz* can render an entire product *Chametz*.

#### **Preparing The Home**

A thorough house cleaning is undertaken in preparation for Passover to be sure that the home is *Chametz* free. In addition to the entire house, the following places should be checked to ensure they are free from *Chametz*:

Office, car, pockets of clothing (especially children's), pocket books etc. Vacuum-cleaner bags should be discarded. Pet foods usually contain *Chametz*. Consult the Rabbi as to which foods can be used.

#### Mechirat Chametz – Selling The Chametz

Not only is one prohibited from eating Chametz, but

one is also prohibited from possessing any *Chametz* on Passover. Nor are we allowed to derive any benefit from such *Chametz*. *Chametz*, which was in the possession of a Jew on Passover, may not be used even after the holiday. Therefore, any *Chametz* which can not be consumed or disposed of before a passover, must be sold to a non-Jew.

The sale of *Chametz* should take place before the onset of Passover. The legal intricacies covering this transfer of property

are many and only a competent Rabbi should be entrusted with its execution. If one is going abroad or in case of emergency when the *Chametz* cannot be sold, consult the Rabbi as to the proper procedure.

#### Storing Sold Chametz & Chametz Utensils

All vessels which have been used for *Chametz*, as well as any *Chametz* intended not to be eaten before Passover but to be sold should be put aside in an inaccessible place. The vessels should be thoroughly cleansed of any trace of *Chametz*. If possible these and other items included in the sale of *Chametz* should be stored in a locked room with the key out of reach or the cabinet containing *Chametz* should be taped. Included in the Power of Attorney to sell the *Chametz* is the authorization to rent out the areas containing the *Chametz* for the duration of Passover.

It is best that a set of dishes, pots, pans and utensils be set aside specifically for Passover use. However, if necessary, some utensils used during the year may also be used on Passover provided that they have first been properly Kashered. If you wish to *Kasher* for Passover, consult Rabbi Mykoff.

#### Ta'anit Bechorim—Fast of the First Born

When the Almighty slew the firstborn of Egypt, He spared the first born of the children of Israel. Therefore, all first-born sons of Israel are required to fast on the day

#### Birkat Ha'Chama - A Rare Opportunity

Once every twenty-eight years, the sun is in exactly the same place in the sky, at the same hour, on the same day of the week that it was at the time of its creation. We mark this rare occasion with great joy, by going outside in the morning, to recite the special blessing of "Birkat Hachama", acknowledging G-d's creation. On Wednesday, April 8, erev Pesach, we will have the opportunity to perform this mitzvah which was last performed in 1981 and which will not occur again until 2037.

The blessing is as follows:

# Baruch Atah Ado-nai, Elo-hei-nu Melech Ha'Olam, Oseh Ma-aseh Bereishit.

Blessed are You, Lord, our G-d, King of the Universe, who makes the work of creation.

before Passover in gratitude for the Almighty's salvation. It has, however, been a custom for many centuries that the fast day is broken by a *Seudas Mitzvah*, a festive meal in celebration of a *Mitzvah*, such as a *Siyum*, a celebration at the conclusion of the study of a book of the Talmud. The *Siyum Bechorim* will be held in the Synagogue, Wednesday, April 8, following morning services which will begin at 7:15 a.m.

#### Bedikat Chametz—Search for Chametz

In order to assure that no *Chametz* is to be found in one's house on Passover, we perform a Search for *Chametz* 



the night before Pesach. This year the search is made on Tuesday night, April 7. As soon as night falls, we make the final inspection for the *Chametz* by the light of a

candle or a flashlight. BEFORE the search we recite the following blessing:

Boruch Atoh A-do-nai E-lo-haynu Melech Ha'olam Asher Ki'dishanu B'mitzvotav Vi'tzivanu Al Bi'ur Chametz.

With the candle lit, we carefully search every room and any area of the house that my contain *Chametz*.

We then take all the *Chametz* that was found in the search and place it in a conspicuous place to be burned on the morning of Wednesday, April 8, before 11:40 AM. Food intended to be sold or eaten after the search should also be put carefully aside. The search should also be conducted in places of business to be certain no *Chametz*. (Continued on page 5)



This is the same blessing recited when one sees lightning and other works of nature. However, because of the rarity of Birkat HaChama, additional prayers are

Psalms 19, 121, 148 and others. The blessing is recited after the Morning Prayer service until 1:00 p.m.

If April 8 is cloudy, Birkat HaChama may still be recited so long as the form of the sun is visible through the clouds. If the sun is completely obscured, one should recite the prayer to mark the occasion, but not using the Name of G-d.

Birkat HaChama should be recited outdoors, facing east towards Jerusalem. Someone who is unable to leave the house, or who may be confined, may recite it from a window. This is true even in an airplane. Ideally, the mitzvah should be performed together with a large group of people.

People leaving their home before Passover must search for *Chametz* the night before their departure without reciting the blessing

#### Erev Pesach—Day Before Pesach

On the day before Passover, Wednesday, April 8, <u>Chametz may not be eaten after 10:20 AM.</u> From that time on only foods which are kosher for Passover may be eaten. <u>However, one should not eat any *Matzab* the entire day prior to the *Seder*. *Chametz* should be burned by 11:40 A.M. after which time the possession of *Chametz* is prohibited. The following declaration of nullification should be said before 11:40 A.M.:</u>

"All leaven or anything leavened which is in my possession whether I have seen it or not, whether I have observed it or not, whether I have removed it or not, shall be considered naught and ownerless as the dust of the earth".

#### ERUV TAVSHILIN

When Yom Tov falls on Thursday and Friday as do the first days of Pesach this year, then we must make an Eruv Tavshilin to allow us to cook on Friday for the Shabbat .

The Eruv Tavshilin consists of two cooked items, a piece of Matzah and something cooked, for example, a boiled egg or a piece of fish, which have been prepared before the onset of the Festival. The blessing: "Blessed are You, Hashem, our G-d, King of the Universe, who has commanded us, concerning the mitzvah of the eruv" is recited and the two foods are put aside until Shabbat. They are eaten at the Shabbat meal.

The Eruv Tavshilin symbolically serves as the beginning of the preparation of food for Shabbat. Thus, any subsequent cooking done on the Festival is considered to be a continuation of the preparation begun before the Festival.

#### Seder Preparation

As is true every year, certain *Seder* preparations should preferably be made before *Yom Tov*. They include:

- roasting the shankbone
- roasting the egg
- mixing the salt water
- · grinding or mashing the ingredients for charoset
- grating horseradish to be used as maror
- checking the romaine lettuce for insects

One who forgot to grind the ingredients for charoset or to grate the horseradish for maror, may do so on Wednesday night for the first Seder and on Thursday night for the second seder.

#### Requirements of the Seder

There are five basic obligations that are to be performed by each participant during the *Seder*.

- 1. Eating Matzah. The minimum quantity of Matzah to be consumed is a little more than one third of an average, machine made Matzah.
- 2. Drinking four cups of wine (*Arba Kosot*). The minimum volume of the cups used during the *Seder* is 3.0 fluid ounces (86 cc). Participants should drink more than half of this amount for each of the cups.
- 3. Eating bitter herbs (maror). The minimum volume for *maror* when using horseradish is 0.7 fluid ounces (19 grams); when using romaine lettuce leaves the minimum amount is 8" x 10"; when using stalks the minimum is 3" x 5".
- 4. Relating the story of the exodus (Magid). No limit!
- 5. Reciting Psalms of Praise (Hallel).

#### Sefirat Ha'Omer- Counting the Omer

The Torah commands us that from the second day of *Pesach*— the day the *Omer* offering of new barley was brought in the Temple— forty-nine days are to be counted and the festival of *Shavuot* is commemorated on the fiftieth day. This period is called *Sefirat Ha'Omer*, the Counting of the *Omer*.

The *Sefirah* also recalls the seven weeks following the Exodus, when our ancestors prepared themselves to receive the Torah at Mt. Sinai. This responsibility to prepare oneself to receive the Torah is applicable every year, as we relive the Exodus from bondage and strive to be worthy of receiving the Torah.

Originally, the *Sefirah* period was a time of rejoicing, but it is now observed as a period of semi-mourning for several reasons: the absence of the Temple; the death of Rabbi Akiva's 24,000 students during thirty-three days of the Sefirah period; and a string of bloody massacres which devastated Jewish communities during the time of the Crusades.

We begin counting on the second night of Pesach, Thursday, April 9th.

were not free to leave. 2) "And I will rescue you from serving them." This was the first phase of the spiritual freedom when on the fourteenth of Nissan the Jewish nation slaughtered the pascal lamb, demonstrating their negation of any affiliation with idolatry, for the lamb was a major diety of the Egyptians. 3) "And I will redeem you with an outstretched arm" referring to the second phase of the physical freedom when on the fifteenth of Nissan the Jewish nation at midday left Egypt. 4) "And I will take you unto Me as My people and I will be to you as your Gd". This represents the second phase of the spiritual freedom which they experienced at Mt. Sinai when they became the nation of G-d.

We hope that the future redemption of Israel and the coming of the messiah will be fulfilled in our lifetime.

#### PASSOVER 2009 DELEGATION OF POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR SALE OF CHAMETZ

I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi A. J. Mykoff to act in my place and stead, and in my behalf, to sell all CHAMETZ possessed by me, knowingly or unknowingly, as defined by the Torah and Rabbinic Law (e.g., Chametz, doubt of Chametz, and all kind of Chametz mixtures; also Chametz that tends to harden and to adhere to a surface on the inside of pans, pots or cooking and usable utensils, and all kinds of live animals that have been eating Chametz or mixtures thereof). And to lease all places wherein the Chametz owned by me may be found, especially in the premises located at \_\_\_\_\_\_ and elsewhere.

Rabbi A. J. Mykoff also has the full right to sell and to lease by transactions, as he deems fit and proper and for such time which he believes necessary, in accordance with all detailed terms and detailed forms as explained in the general authorization contract which I have given this year to Rabbi A. J. Mykoff to sell the Chametz.

This general authorization is made a part of this agreement. Also I do hereby give the said Rabbi A. J. Mykoff full power and authority to appoint a substitute in his stead with full power to sell and to lease as provided herein. The above given power is in conformity with all Torah, Rabbinical regulations and laws, and is also in accordance with the laws of the State and Federal Governments of the United States.
