THE RABBI'S MESSAGE

This Tuesday night, May 22nd, the holiday of Shavuot will commence. It is a two day celebration observed Wednesday and Thursday, May 23rd and 24th. Shavuot is identified in the liturgy a אנר מון מתן תורתנו "The Time of the Giving of the Torah", for it commemorates the revelation at Mt. Sinai when Hashem, the Almighty, spoke directly to the Jewish Nation, proclaiming the Ten Commandments, and their acceptance thereof.

Unlike the other holidays, Shavuot was not assigned a specific date. In the Torah the holiday of Shavuot is primarily linked with the *Omer* offering and a seven week counting period, starting with Passover and climaxing on the 50th day. Thus, the name "Shavuot", the Holiday of Weeks.

It is also called *Yom Habikurim*, the day of the first ripe fruits, when a special new offering was brought to the Temple.

Surprisingly, Shavuot, as commemorating מתן תורה - Matan Torah, the revelation at Mount Sinai, is not noted at all in the Torah. The only way we can directly connect Shavuot with the giving of the Torah is from the Book of Exodus (Chapter XIX) which describes how "in the third month [Sivan] following the children of Israel's departure from Egypt on this day they came to the Sinai Desert. They camped there opposite the mountain..."

One reason Shavuot is not openly identified with the giving of the Torah is attributed to the reluctance to commemorate a single day with our acceptance of the Torah, for every day is an opportunity for us to renew our acceptance of the Torah and make it part of our lives. As we proclaim in the blessing made over the Torah: "Blessed are You, our G-d, who *gives* the Torah."

It was held this year on Friday night, May 4th. Rabbi Mykoff was very pleased with the unprecedented turnout of both Poile Zedek members and members of the larger Jewish community, who came to experience the beauty of *Shabbos* with Friday night services and a festive *Shabbos* meal.

Shavuos this years begins Tuesday eve., May 22. As is customary, Poile Zedek will celebrate the holiday of "The Giving of our Torah" by hosting a Torah Study Vigil on Tuesday night, following evening services and a wonderful holiday meal. Poile Zedek will also sponsor a Torah Study Program on Wednesday, May 23, following morning services and a holiday luncheon. Please join us—there is no charge and this is a wonderful time to recommit to Torah learning.

The Holiday of Shavuot



Shavuot, Z'man Matan Torateinu, The Time of the Giving of Our Torah, is the second of the three major pilgrimage festivals (Pesach being the first and Sukkot the third) and comes

exactly fifty days from Pesach. Shavuot, also known as Atzeret, which means completion, is the culmination of the odyssey which we began on Pesach. The goal of our redemption and departure from Egypt was to receive the Torah. On the sixth day of Sivan in the year 2448 after creation, the revelation at Mt. Sinai took place. G-d gave the Torah to the Jewish people on Mt. Sinai. Every year, on Shavuot, we renew our acceptance of G-d's gift.

Shavuot, which means "weeks", signifies the completion of the seven week period between Pesach and Shavuot (the 'Omer' period) during which time the Jewish people prepared themselves to receive the Torah. During this period they cleansed themselves of the scars of slavery and elevated themselves spiritually so that they would be ready to enter into an eternal covenant with Hashem, through receiving and accepting the Torah.

The word Shavuot also means "oaths". On this day Hashem swore eternal devotion to us, and we in turn pledged everlasting loyalty to Him. Our Sages have compared it to a wedding between G-d and the Jewish people.

Our Sages said that before Hashem gave us the Torah He demanded guarantors. The Jews made a number of suggestions, all of which were rejected by G-d, until they declared, "Our children will be our guarantors that the Jewish people will cherish and observe the Torah"; G-d immediately accepted them and agreed to give them the Torah.

On this day we received a gift (matan) from Above which we could not have achieved with our own limited faculties. We received the ability to reach and touch the Divine; not only to be cultivated human beings, but Divine human beings who are capable of rising above and beyond the limitations of nature. Jewish men, women and, especially, children should make every effort to be present in a synagogue on May 23, as the Ten Commandments are read from the Torah.

The holiday of Shavuot is also known by two other names: Yom Habikurim and Chag HaKatzir. Yom Habikurim, the Day of the First Fruits, is an expression of thanks to G-d. Starting from Shavuot, each farmer in the Land of Israel brought an offering to the Temple of the first wheat, barley, grapes, figs



pomegranates, olives and dates that grew in his field.

Chag HaKatzir, the Festival of the Harvest,

commemorates the harvesting of the wheat. The wheat, the last of the grains to be ready to be cut, was harvested at this time of the year.

The Book of Ruth

It is on the second day of Shavuot that we read the Book of Ruth, one of the five *megillot*, scrolls, which are read on the various holidays.

This Megillah tells the story of Ruth and her mother-in-law, Naomi. Ruth is a Moabite woman, who, after her husband dies, follows Naomi back to Israel and pledges to her: "Your nation shall be my nation and your G-d shall be my G-d." In Israel, Ruth marries Naomi's kinsman, Boaz and is the greatgrandmother of King David. Additionally, this episode takes place during the time of the bringing of the first fruits.

Ruth's acceptance of G-d and His commandments mirrors our acceptance of His Torah. Also, the bringing of the first fruits, and the harvest season depicted, makes reading the Book of Ruth particularly meaningful on Shavuot.

Shavuot Customs

Tikun Leil Shavuot — It is customary for many to stay up all night the first night of Shavuot learning Torah. When the B'nai Yisrael were about to receive the Torah, rather than sleepless anticipation, B'nai Yisrael overslept. As rectification for this, it is customary to stay up the first night of Shavuot all night learning.

Akdamut is a piyut, liturgical poem, read on the first day of Shavuot before the Torah is read. It was composed as an introduction to the Ten Commandments by Rabbi Meir ben Yitzchak (during the time of the crusades in the 11th century). Akdamut, written in Aramaic, describes Hashem's creation of the world and the splendor of the World to Come, the angels praise of the Almighty and the greatness and suffering of the Jewish people. As it says:

"Were the skies parchment, were all the reeds quills, Were the seas and all waters made of ink, Were all the world's inhabitants made scribes." We could not begin to describe the glory of Hashem.

Dairy—It is customary to also eat a dairy meal on Shavuot. The most noted reason for this is because when B'nai Yisrael received the Torah and learned the laws of ritual slaughter, they had no time to prepare kosher meat and thus had dairy instead.

Another reason for the Torah's reluctance to directly identify Shavuot with *Matan Torah*, is perhaps due to the fact that after committing ourselves to fulfilling G-d's Torah, we failed to live up to our commitment. Only forty days later there was the incident of the Golden Calf and the breaking of the Tablets, containing the Ten Commandments. It was only on Yom Kippur, after our *teshuva* - repentance was accepted, that we received the Second Tablets. Because of this, to this very day, on Shavuot, we endeavor to strengthen our commitment to Hashem and His Torah.

Congregation Poile Zedek represented at NORPAC's Mission to Washington

On Wednesday, May 9, 2007, NORPAC, a nonpartisan political action committee, sponsored their 2007 "Mission to Washington." Our own Richard Shusteris played a major role in coordinating this program which was attended by over 700 Jews from New Jersey and the Metropolitan New York area. It was the largest pro-Israel PAC event of its kind. Among the many representatives who addressed the delegation was Senator Lieberman of Connecticut.

Rabbi Mykoff was invited to participate in this program to lobby congressional and senatorial members of our government on behalf of the State of Israel, in order to forge a stronger link between the U.S. and Israel.
